At its core, *Indigenous Child and Youth Care: Weaving Two Heart Stories Together* is about unity. Students will cultivate a practice that encourages ethical spaces of engagement while steering away from surface-level or disingenuous interactions.

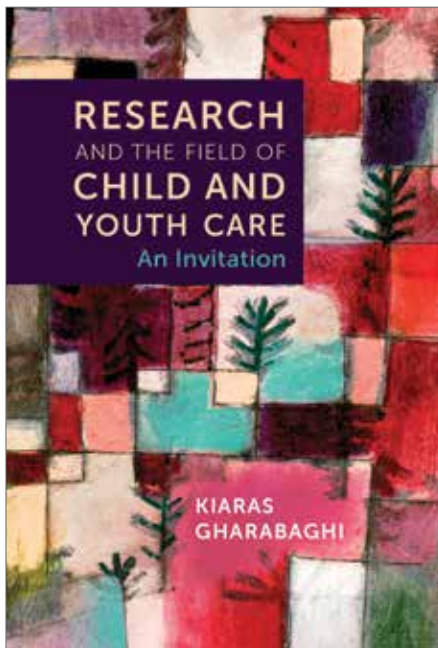
The text applies concepts and theories such as relational accountability, interconnectivity, resurgence, community-centred approaches, wise practices, relationship-building, and anti-oppression, anti-racist, and social justice frameworks to enrich CYC practices and prepare students to engage with Indigenous children, youth, and families in an informed, meaningful way.
